

Introduction

- What resonated with you as you read the introduction?
- Have you ever pondered any of the four questions in bullets on page *vi*? Take a few minutes now to ponder one of the four that you are most drawn to and share your thoughts.
- Patricia shares how in the Word of God, there is only one Teacher, "the Holy Spirit... who will teach you everything" (John 14:26) God who is searching for us, calling us to respond to His great love for us. Has the Word of God ever made you feel this great love before? How do you feel now knowing that the Holy Spirit is your teacher as you read the Word of God guiding you to feel this great love?
- Have you ever engaged in "Sacred Listening" or *Lectio Divina*? Did you enjoy it? What parts did you enjoy or not enjoy"? Have you thought about it as a mutual

listening, both you listening to God but also God listening to our hearts? How does this make you feel?

- Which infancy narrative story do you think you will look in a deeper way after reading this chapter? Why?

- What resonated with you as you read this chapter?
- Was there anything you read in the chapter that was new for you this time?

- How has looking closely at Ezekiel 34 affected the way you look at the Good Shepherd parable? Psalm 23? What do these revelations help us understand about the person of Christ?

- After reading about the Paschal Mystery (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Sunday) is there an aspect of our liturgy of the Eucharist today that speaks to you differently now?
- What does this chapter reveal to you about who Christ is?

Chapter 4: The Parable of the True Vine in the Gospel according to John

The Good Shepherd and the Child Podcast Episode 90: The Parable of the True Vine with Patricia Coulter

- What resonated with you as you read this chapter?
- Was there anything you read in the chapter that was new for you this time?
- On page 88, Sofia says, "The Jews say the Messiah is coming and will come, with a strong sense of waiting. As Christians perhaps we do not have as strong a sense of waiting as we should" What do you think about this statement?
- On page 96, Sofia says, "To 'remain' is an attitude, a way of being; and this proportion of ten to five emphasizes the importance of being over doing. What is essential is to be, what we do depends on and flows as a consequence of our 'being' a part of the vine." What emotions come to the surface for you when you read about this? Is this easy or difficult for you?
- What does this chapter reveal to you about who Christ is?
